


CONSONANT /r/

- */r/ is the voiced consonant sound. (vocal cords are vibrated)
- *To make this sound, open your mouth slightly, the lips come out, pull the tongue back without touching the teeth.
- The back of the tongue is raised.
- **The sides of the tongue touch the back teeth.**





CORSONART /r/

- The center of the back of the tongue is lower and the air travels through this groove to create the sound.
- The position of soft palate is raised (oral)

British and American English

In British English the consonant /r/ is pronounced only before a vowel (e.g. rent). In all other cases, the /r/ is silent (e.g. car, bird).

In American English the /r/ is always pronounced.

*The three diphthongs /iə eə ʊə/ are found only in British English. In corresponding place American English has a similar vowel follow by /r/

e.g. near BrE/nıə(r)/ AE/nir/,
hair BrE/heə(r)/ AE/her/,
sure BrE/ʃʊə(r)/ AE/ʃʊr/

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II. CONSONANT //

*/l/ is the voiced consonant sound.

To create this sound, put the front part of the tongue behind the teeth. The air comes out from the sides of the tongue.



II. CONSONANT //

The tip of the tongue is placed against the middle of the teeth ridge.


The position of soft palate is raised (oral).





